Butterflies and Caterpillars will continue with the theme of Autumn (age and stage appropriate). This week we shall concentrating on vegetables and how they are grown from seed and how they end up in our shops. Farms will be play a major part in role play and we are hopeful that a farmer will pop in and explain to the children just how much work goes in to growing crops ready for harvest.

Focus will be on fine motor skills, using tweezers and threading to encourage concentration and focus. We shall continue with PE with Joe, to engage those core muscle groups. Children are already aware of what is healthy and what is not. We have noticed a genuine effort from parents that lunch boxes are improving. Please try and steer away from processed foods such as the Dairylea packs. These are full of salt and/or sugar

Spotlight on Outdoor Learning



Being outdoors is different form being inside - so planning for the outdoors requires just as much attention as it does for indoor learning. The key at HWPP is to ensure that free flow play allows children to mirror both inside and out. Our aim is to translate what we teach your child in both environments. As we have such





a wonderful back drop at HWPP we waste no time in ensuring the children explore their surroundings. Their fascination is palpable and just when you think perhaps they haven't absorbed what we have been discussing, they surprise you and say,

"Look Angie, berries for the birds, but we mustn't eat them or we will be sick!" Clearly stated by Sophie who despite being quiet in circle time comes to life when out in the woods as do so many of the children.

Therefore, outdoors often offers children what the indoors cannot: different things that invite curiosity, action, interaction and play; different ways of feeling, being and behaving or linking to experiences and learning. Just as we finished our woodland walk we treated the children to sample Panini's and have a small cup of hot chocolate which they thoroughly enjoyed and were impeccably behaved. In turn this unravels real life experiences which children have an innate fascination with. Such authentic experiences builds their confidence and curiosity and we intend on ensuring this continues throughout the year.

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Reception Places

Some helpful hints/questions to pose when looking around primary schools.

Don't be afraid to ask questions.

Do look around the classrooms especially reception. Look at the facilities the school has to offer.

Seek out the reception class teacher and engage with him/her. Does he/she have an assistant in the classroom?

How many forms and children in a class.

Ask about the routine of the day, times. i.e., What happens at lunch time. Packed lunch or school dinners.

How many play times do the children have?

What pre and post school activities can your child participate in. How competitive is the school? Do they encourage and support talented children in any field of sport or academia? Equally, what extra support do they offer if your child needs specific learning support. The latter is very important as you do not want your child to feel isolated and unsupported in what will be a vast difference to HWPP. Classes are always bigger and teachers simply do not have the time to focus on one child for any length of time.

Do they welcome all faiths and denominations - do you have a preference?

What languages to they offer?

Of course this is not exhaustive list of questions or points but are key criteria when looking around. I am a firm believer of what fits right when you enter a school. You know your child and you should aim to choose the right school for him/her rather than go with kudos and outstanding results. Your child will only perform well if they are happy and fulfilled where they are. Too much pressure early on can spell disaster later on.

If possible ask to visit the school during normal hours so you can sense what a day in the classroom would be like. It gives more of a realistic feel. I hope these pointers help, but should require any further support don't hesitate to come and speak with me.
